PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Design Workshop's Faculty Research Partner program was established to share knowledge across academic and professional practice realms. The program underscores the firm's founding by Joe Porter, Don Ensign and two other faculty at North Carolina State University in 1969 as a place for faculty, students and practitioners to collaborate.

The firm is pleased to provide the opportunity for academic professionals to experience a professional design studio while on sabbatical or summer break from their learning institution and to use the contact with projects and design teams to inform their research and teaching. Design Workshop's staff benefit from the infusion of outside thinking, deep subject matter expertise and exposure to academic research. The program nurtures the cultural exchange of design philosophies among academics and practitioners, strengthens the firm's relationships with universities and professors, and shapes the education of future design and planning professionals by deepening faculty understanding of the needs of practice. Over the years, the firm has hosted faculty with expertise in a range of subjects, including planting design, stormwater management, ecology and aesthetics, writing as part of design, and the business of design practice. Faculty are warmly welcomed into the firm and invited to a variety of studio-based and firmwide gatherings—design reviews, celebrations, learning sessions, etc.

The honorific comes with a stipend and is well-suited for faculty with other sources of funding for a term-time or summer sabbatical. Housing is not provided. Selected faculty are expected to deliver at least one firmwide presentation on their research and engagement with the firm, and to provide a research synopsis presentation to the DW Board. Selected faculty may be asked to prepare a non-disclosure agreement (NDA) to both protect Design Workshop and permit sharing of the research findings. Applications are accepted on an ongoing basis.
