

### **GREENING FIVE POINTS**

The Green Dot Coalition, an equityfocused placemaking organization,
requested support from the DW
Foundation to advance their community
engagement efforts in Denver's Five
Points neighborhood which faces
built environment challenges resulting
from discriminatory redlining, years of
disinvestment, and climate change.

The DW Foundation and a team of Dr. Charles Fountain interns collaborated with the Green Dot Coalition to develop a green infrastructure toolkit, called "Greening Five Points," in support of the community-led, equity-focused urban greening effort. The toolkit communicates and advocates for the value of green infrastructure, validates residents' stories of lived experience with data and analysis, and identifies priority improvements to maximize the Coalition's limited resources.

DW Foundation's support for the Green Dot Coalition will continue in 2024 to support implementation and planning efforts for Greening Five Points, and will help engage the neighborhood in improvements that will provide dramatic and lasting environmental, social and climate resilience benefits.







## PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: JEVON TAYLOR

Co-Founder, Green Dot Coalition

Jevon Taylor is the Co-Founder of the Green Dot Coalition and CEO of Green Spaces, a co-working, incubator marketplace and event space in Denver's RiNO neighborhood that supports creatives, entrepreneurs and non-profits through lenses of social impact and economic sustainability. A Denver native, Jevon's main passions lie in diversifying his impact within the Denver community by providing a platform to amplify the voices of local creators, spearheading various community development, environmental and educational programs.

Outside of running Green Spaces,
Jevon has worked within multiple
urban farming organizations, school
districts, and now serves on various
boards including the RiNo Art District's
Business Improvement District Board.
Jevon's main goal is to cultivate
sustainable growth and positive change
across the city for future generations.

### THE HIVE PARK

The small, tightly knit rural community of Lewiston Woodville, North Carolina worked with a diverse team to give shape to an ambitious vision: The Hive Park.

Like many rural towns in the South, Lewiston Woodville enjoyed 20th century growth, only to be abandoned by industries that had provided stability. Worsening job prospects, social isolation and health and well-being issues underscore Lewiston Woodville's need for a shared open space or park.

The Hive Park was fueled from the beginning by its leaders, including the town matriarch, a respected minister and an environmental justice advocate. The site donated for the park is centrally located and surrounded by a supportive network of faith-based and youth empowerment organizations.

The engagement process led by the Design Workshop Dr. Charles Fountain Interns revealed that community members who had never had a public park of their own simply wanted a place to be together outdoors. A grassroots vision highlights the town's rich history and community, supports healthy living and restores native ecologies to create a park for all.

The park concept plan developed by the Design Workshop Dr. Charles Fountain Intern team in partnership with DW Foundation provides simple and accessible paths and spaces for the entire town, including young children, families, teens and seniors alike. The programming and stewardship vision engages local partners to foster community, celebrate diversity, and support shared park maintenance.

Local and national partners, donors and supporters are advancing the vision for The Hive Park so that construction can begin in 2024.









## PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: VIVIAN SAUNDERS

Founder, Hive House and Vitality Center

Vivian Saunders is Director of the Hive House, a nonprofit community center and afterschool program in rural Bertie County, North Carolina. Her love for children drove her to quit her job at Perdue Inc. and pursue her passion to serve the community by opening the first 24-hour child care center. Years later, Saunders expanded her child-focused mission by installing and administering two technology community centers in Bertie County and served over 100 students at the Hive, an alternative school for young men in 6th through 12th grades.

Saunders' work reached national and international recognition when her story was depicted in the film *In the Hive*, staring Loretta Devine, Michael Clark Duncan, and Vivica Fox. "The best way to get things accomplished in my community is to be honest and respectful," says Saunders. "I don't see myself as the person that should get the glory for the job. I am the person that gets the job done." She was formally educated at Fayetteville State University and Martin Community College.



## CAPACITY BUILDING

Imagine if historically under-resourced communities could chart paths to a sustainable future. Capacity building is an investment in the future health of a community. DW Foundation's capacity building initiative brings people together to prioritize problems, look for attainable solutions and craft plans for meaningful first steps that build momentum towards larger goals.

This effort, launched through a national Request for Applications in 2023, addresses the systemic underfunding of public projects in historically underrepresented communities and provides no-cost support for community teams.


## KINSTON TEENS EQUITABLE DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Kinston Teens, Inc. is a nonprofit organization with a mission of empowering young people through service, leadership, and civic engagement. They lead efforts in voter registration and engagement, leadership skills training, community development, and crisis response. Their organization operates primarily in Kinston's East Kinston neighborhood, the focus for this capacity building opportunity. East Kinston is considered to be the most economically disadvantaged census tract in the state of North Carolina.

The Just Communities Lab is a program of North Carolina State University that focuses on landscape strategies to advance social equity and environmental justice in communities. The Just Communities Lab addresses equity both in the work it takes on and the researchers and students it recruits.

DW Foundation supported visioning for a vibrant, healthy, beautiful, connected, resilient and restored East Kinston. The plan is being shaped through community feedback, historical development analysis and facilitated conversations with stakeholders. DW Foundation is helping build equitable opportunities in East Kinston by co-developing concrete strategies in real estate, organizational growth programming and partnerships.

The Equitable Development Plan focuses on actionable strategies for Kinston Teens and highlights 'big moves' requiring leadership from other entities to support the community-driven vision.





## PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: CHRIS SUGGS

Founder, Kinston Teens

Chris is the Founder of Kinston Teens. Inc., a nonprofit organization he started in October 2014 operating at the intersections of youth empowerment and community development. From transforming vacant lots into neighborhood amenities, to building platforms for young people to be involved in government and make their voices heard, Kinston Teens works to ensure that Chris's peers and local community are both thriving. The organization coordinates voter registration efforts, leadership trainings, social events, and more initiatives for young people in Kinston, North Carolina.

Chris's proudest accomplishments in this capacity include helping to change North Carolina's law of prosecuting 16 and 17-year-old non-violent offenders as adults and now allowing them to be serviced under the juvenile justice system, and the implementation of an anonymous school safety reporting app in North Carolina public schools for students to assist in keeping their schools safe.

## NORTHEAST HOUSTON REDEVELOPMENT COUNCIL


The NE Houston Redevelopment Council (NEHC) is a lead organization in the Northeast Houston Collaborative which represents 15 community based organizations. The NEHC partners with historically disadvantaged communities in Northeast Houston suffering from impacts of legacy environmental racism and climate change.

The organizations share a vision to ensure a more equitable future for Northeast Houston. The Collaborative member organizations seek to identify and prioritize clean energy, resiliency, and mobility projects in Northeast Houston and to ensure equitable funding at all levels of government.


Five neighborhoods–Kashmere Gardens, Trinity/Houston Gardens, Settegast, Pleasantville, and Greater Fifth Ward– came to form the NE Houston Collaborative in 2023 to pursue a strategy for climate justice. With 57,000 citizens over 20 square miles, the area is majorly impacted by flooding, food insecurity, and insufficient infrastructure.

There are two "Momentum Projects" that have been identified by the Collaborative as key initial priorities, including "Community Resilience Hubs" and "Hub Home Networks." Community Resilience Hubs will be located at public facilities to serve the larger population, providing solar arrays and battery storage for disaster relief.

The Hub Homes will be a network of houses, each serving twenty neighbors. The houses will be equipped with plumbing and electrical improvements and include supplies to be used for natural disasters. Both of these hub types are planned to be scaled up to create lasting benefits for the community.



ready for the next disaster.


